CLOWN is a large and well built village and scattered parish, 8 miles E.N.E. from Chesterfield, and 4 miles E. from Staveley station, contains 1919A. 2R. 13P. of land, a strong rich fertile soil, partly on lime and partly on gritstone, principally arable, and had in 1851, 156 houses and 660 inhabitants, of which number the males and females were equal; rateable value, £2344 1s. 8d. The village is pleasantly situated in a fine open situation sheltered from the N. winds by a gentle acclivity. The Duke of Portland is lord of the manor, which is partly copyhold, and he with Hy. Bowdon, Esq., the Venerable. Archdeacon Hill, and Mr. John Ludlow, are the principal owners. Here are also several smaller owners. The Church, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, is an ancient edifice, partly in the Norman and partly in the later style of architecture; it is situated about $\frac{1}{4}$ mile E. from the village, and consists of side aisles, a square embattled tower, with four pinnacles and three bells. The *living* is a rectory, valued in the King's book. at £7 0s. 10d., now £311, is in the patronage of the Crown, and incumbency of the Rev. Chas. Walter Whiter M.A., who resides at the Rectory, a commodious brick residence a short distance from the church, and has 65A. 1R. 8P. of glebe. Tithes have been commuted and the parish lands were enclosed in 1780. The Wesleyan Methodists have a small neat stone chapel here, erected by subscription in 1837, at a cost of £80, which will seat 60 persons. The Wesleyan Association chapel, situated nearly in the centre of the village is a neat brick building, and will hold about 100; and the Primitive Methodists have a small stone chapel, erected in 1834, which will accommodate about 80. Here is an Endowed school, erected in 1726,—(see charities),—a small ancient building, situated at the east end of the village. *Harlesthorne* is a small hamlet and village, about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile, north, from the Church. *Whitebrick-moor* consists of several scattered farms, of which two are in this parish. *Romely House* is a neat mansion, pleasantly situated about 3 miles S. from Eckington. In the tastefully laid out pleasure grounds are two avenues of yew frees, remarkable for their curious growth; the shrubberies contain a great variety of beautiful fir trees; it is the property of the Venerable Archdeacon Hill, and residence of Godfrey Croft, Esq. *Southgate House*, the seat and property of Henry Bowdon Esq., is a handsome modern mansion, fronting the east on the Chesterfield and Worksop road, 1 mile N.N.E. from Clown church, and 9 miles E. by N. from Chesterfield, is delightfully situated in a fine and healthy country surrounded by thriving woods and plantations; it is within the ancient manor of Harlesthorne, of which Mr. Bowdon is the proprietor. The family of Bowdon is of great antiquity, in the county of Derby, and was resident for four centuries at Bowdon Hall, near Chapel-en-le-Frith; that estate however, passed from the family, through an heiress, in 1680. From that time the family has been chiefly resident either at Beighton Fields, in the parish of Barlborough, or at Southgate House. Mr. Bowdon is the representative of the family in male descent. The first of this family we have on record is Thomas Bowdon, of Bowdon Hall, living in 1450, although the family had been resident there from 1317, in which year they built the chancel of the church at Chapel-en-le-Frith, and from that time it was commonly called Chapel Bowdon. Thomas was succeeded by his son George, of Bowdon, who married Barbara, daughter of Nicholas Bagshaw, of Abney. He left a son, George, of Bowdon, living in 1550, who married Ellen, daughter of Austin Pole, of Langley, who was succeeded by his son Thomas, of Bowdon, who married Anne daughter of Henry Bagshaw, of Ridge. He left with other children Nicholas and George. Nicholas, the eldest, married the heiress of Barnby, and had three sons, all of whom died without issue, when the Bowdon Hall estate passed to his brother George, who left two daughters, and who carried the estate out of the family. Thomas Bowdon, (the second surviving son of Thomas, who married Anne Bagshaw,) married Ellen Shrigley, and settled at Whetstone; he left two sons, Henry and John, the former of whom married the sister and heiress of John Alleyne, of Whetstone Hall; John, his brother, married the daughter of Richard Beard, of Beard Hall, and died of the plague in 1665, without issue. Henry left a son (Henry) who however did not take any benefit from his uncle Alleyne's bequest of the Whetstone property, as the protestant

heir succeeded in wresting the estate from him by means of the penal law against Catholics then in force. The above mentioned Henry married the only daughter and heiress of John Hewet, of Beighton Fields, from whom he acquired that estate, and which still remains in the family. He left a son John, who had three wives, leaving issue by all of them, the eldest son (John) by the first wife Mary, daughter of John Barker, of Barlborough House, married Alice, daughter of George Johnson, of Shelfield, in Warwickshire, an elder sister of his father's third wife, and left a son, Henry Bowdon, of Southgate House and Beighton Fields, he married Mary, daughter and heiress of Joseph Erdeswick, of Hartley, representative of the ancient family of that name of Sandon Hall, in Staffordshire; he left an only son, John Bruno Bowdon, of Southgate House and Beighton Fields, who married Mary Martha, eldest daughter of Edward Ferrers, Esq., of Badesley Clinton, in Warwickshire, representative in the mail line of that ancient and noble family. The above named John B. Bowdon served the office of high sheriff in 1841, he left at his death in 1850, two sons and four daughters, Henry the eldest, a magistrate and deputy lieutenant for the county of Derby, married in 1853, Henrietta Matilda, daughter of Michael Henry Blount, Esq., of Mapledurham by his wife Elizabeth, daughter of Charles, tenth Lord Petre, and has a daughter Alice; John the second son, inherited the Pleasington Hall estate, Lancashire; by the bequest of his cousin, Mary Anne Butler, and married in 1849, Amelia, daughter of George Whitgreave, Esq., of Moseley Court, Staffordshire, and has a son, Erdeswick, and other children. He is a magistrate and deputy lieutenant of Lancashire. Helena, the eldest daughter, married Peter Constable Maxwell, Esq., third son of Marmadule C. Maxwell, Esq., of Everingham Park. Barbara married Edward Wright, Esq., of Kelvedon Hall. Fanny is a nun in the convent at Oulton, in Staffordshire.

CHARITIES.—*Elizabeth Slater*, in 1706, left £5, whereof £2 was employed in building the poor's seat in the church—3s. in respect of the remainder is paid out of the estate of Henry Bowdon, Esq.

Rev. Francis Gisborne's charity.—(See *Bradley*.)—The annual sum of £5 10s., received by the incumbent, is laid out in warm clothing and given to the poor.

SCHOOL—*John Slater*, in 1727, gave 40s. yearly, charged on Hooker Pitts close and Gascoyne Pingles, to poor widows, until there should be a schoolmaster in Clown, and then for the instruction of six children.

Charles Basseldine, in 1730, surrendered certain lands in Bolsover, and directed the rents to be given to a schoolmaster. The property belonging the school consists of a house, orchard, and croft, together about 3 acres, Damsbrook Meadow closes, called Stone Top and the Esps, with an allotment of 5A. 1R. 6P. in lieu of common right, in consideration of the rents, the master instructs 20 children, and 4 for Slater's donation.

Church Lands.—In the parish book there is a statement of various lands left for the repairs of the church, the whole contains about 5A., let for £3 6s. 8d. which is carried to the churchwardens' general account.

William Wilkson, in 1666, left a rent charge of £5 out of the moor close, in the parish of Bolsover, to be given to the poor.

Edward Woodhead, in 1697, gave to the poor 20s. yearly, out of Romely close.

Andrew Clayton, in 1701, left 20s. yearly, out of lands at Romely. The poor have also 5s. per annum, from the bequest of John Watkinson, left in 1704, and 10s. left by Richard Johnson, in 1714.

Frances Tomkin, in 1705, gave to the poor Saffer's close, let for £3 per annum; the land was open to an adjoining field, but stones are fixed to mark the boundary.

Elizabeth Denham, in 1720, left a house at Clown, the rents to be divided amongst poor widows of Clown and Eckington. A house and croft in Clown, occupied by a widow named Lowde, and claimed as her own, are the premises supposed to be given by Mrs. Denham. It appears Mrs. *Lowde's* mother, a poor woman, was by the parish permitted to occupy them rent free, many years, till the daughter claims them as her own. An allotment of 1A. 3R. 1P. was awarded at the enclosure, now let for £1 18s. per annum, which is divided between the two parishes.

Rev. George Chantrey, in 1722, left 20s. yearly, charged on High Cross closes, in Barlborough, to be given to ten of the poorest families in Clown.

DORE PARISH forms the north west extremity of the Scarsdale Hundred, being bounded on the north by the river Sheaf and the Yorkshire moors, it has the parish of Hathersage on the west, from which the Sheffield and Bakewell road partly separates it. It contains the townships of Dore and Totley, with 5083A. 1R. 11P. of land, and in 1851, had 207 houses, and 977 inhabitants, of whom 545 were males, and 432 females; rateable value, £4,639 12s. 1d. It was enclosed under an act, 49th of Geo. III., and the award signed 10th April, 1823. By an order of Council, 31st January, 1844, agreeable to the plans of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, it was formed into a distinct parish for all civil and ecclesiastical purposes, previous to which they formed a part of the parish of Dronfield, and was subject to one quarter of the rates for the parish church. It is in the Ecclesall Bierlow Union of the parish of Sheffield.

DORE, is a large scattered village and township, on the verge of the Yorkshire moors, 5 miles S.S.W. from Sheffield, contains 3271A. 2R. 7P of land, which since the enclosure has been greatly improved, and in 1851 had 124 houses, and 574 inhabitants, of whom

317 were males, and 257 females; rateable value, £2,828 8s. 9d. The Duke of Devonshire is lord of the manor and principal owner. The Exors. of the late D'Ewes Coke, Esq., Henry Hancock and R. N. Shaw, Esqrs., are also owners. The Church, dedicated to Christ, is a small neat Gothic stone structure, with a low embattled square tower, and was rebuilt on a more convenient site, in the year 1828, for which land was given by the Duke of Devonshire, the cost, £1,000, was partly raised by rate and partly by subscription, aided by a grant of £300 from the Church Building Society; it contains 600 sittings, of which about one half are free. The *living* is a perpetual curacy, value £90, and in 1720 and 1777, was augmented with Queen Anne's bounty to meet benefactions—in 1810, with £200,—and in 1820, with £600 parliamentary grant. Earl Fitzwilliam is patron, and the Rev. J. T. F. Aldred, M.A., incumbent, who resides at the Parsonage, a large handsome brick mansion, erected in 1841 by Earl Fitzwilliam; it is situated a short distance from the church. At the enclosure, 94 acres of land were awarded to the vicar of Dronfield, for tithe and other land to the impropiator. Here is a Free school,—(see charities), built 1821, on the site of the old chapel, and endowed by the Rev. Robert Turrie, and others. The master receives £40 per annum, for which he instructs as many poor children as that sum will pay for at 3d. per week. Here are a few scythe and saw handle manufacturers, and a copperas manufactory near *Ringing Low*. *Abbeydale Villa* is a large handsome mansion, pleasantly situated about 4½ miles from Sheffield, on the Abbeydale road,—is the seat and property of John Roberts, Esq.

TOTLEY is a small pleasant village and scattered township, forming the south side of the parish, on a low eminence, on the Bakewell road, 3½ miles W.N.W. from Dronfield, and 6 miles S.W. from Sheffield; it contains 1811A. 3R. 4P. of land, and in 1851 had 83 houses and 403 inhabitants, of whom 228 were males and 175 females; rateable value, £1,328 2s. 1d. Lord Middleton is lord of the manor and a small owner; G. B. Greaves, Esq., the Exors. of the late D'Ewes Coke, Esq., and Mr. Jph. Ward, are also owners. This was formerly a bleak moory district, which since the enclosure has been greatly improved by cultivation; the population has kept increasing with the improvements in agriculture, by which they are mostly employed. In 1839, the tithe of the old enclosure was commuted for £18 6s. 11d, to the impropiator, and £2 7s. to the vicar of Dronfield, and the new was exonerated by allotments at the enclosure. Near the Sheffield road is an ancient cupola, for smelting lead. Messrs. T. Tinker & Co. have extensive Chemical works here, on the Bakewell road, about 5½ miles from Sheffield. An Infant school—(see charities)—was built in 1827, by D'Ewes Coke, Esq., and is endowed with lands situate at Totley and Coal Aston. Feast, first Sunday after Midsummer day. *The Bents*, half a mile N.W. from Totley, consists of a few scattered farms and cottages. *Totley Vale House* is a neat residence, about three-quarters of a mile from Dore church, the property of J. G. Waterfall, Esq., and the seat of John Wheat, Esq.

CHARITIES.—DORE SCHOOL—*Rev. Robert Turie*, gave £40 for the benefit of the chapelry of Dore, two-thirds of this sum was expended in 1747, in enclosing a piece of common on Dore moor side, the remainder was laid out in enclosing land on Totley common, the proceeds are given to a schoolmaster.

John Dewce gave a yearly sum of, £1 4s. for the instruction of three poor children, and 12s. to be distributed in bread; 12s. per annum was also given by *Eliz. Dewce*, for the like purpose. At the enclosure, the commissioners were directed to award so much of the waste as in their judgment should be worth £30 per annum, for the benefit of a schoolmaster, within the manor of Dore. The lands set out at the award consist of 55A. 3R. 15P., let for £35 14s. per annum. The schoolmaster now receives about £40 a year, for which he instructs as many children as it will pay for at 3d. a week; 30s. per annum is laid out in bread, and distributed to the poor, from the bequest of *Joseph Wolstenholme*, in 1764; and 24s. is paid in satisfaction of the charities of *Richard and Elizabeth Dewce*.

John Raworth, in 1804, left the produce of £20 for a distribution of bread to four poor widows of Dore.

Isaac Shepherd, in 1811, left £20 for a distribution of bread, and £20 for the education of two poor children of Dore. Mr. Heald Unwin holds the legacies at 5 per cent. which are given, as directed.

Totley School.—By indentures, 1753, a piece of waste land, about 4 acres, was conveyed to trustees, in order that a school might be erected upon it, the intention was never carried into effect, and the land is let for £6 10s. per annum, which is paid for the instruction of six poor children. Some time ago, the inhabitants proposed to build a school, by subscription, the plan was however abandoned, and a school was built by the late D'Ewes Coke, Esq., on his own land. A sum of £125, raised towards building the school, was expended in the purchase of land, at Coal Aston, now let for £6 per annum, which is also given to the schoolmaster or schoolmistress, for the instruction of six other poor children.

William Green, 1786, left a rent charge of 12s. yearly, out of his house and croft in Totley, for a distribution of bread, at Dore chapel, every fourth Sunday.

DRONFIELD is an extensive parish, forming the north-west extremity of the Scarsdale Hundred, having Yorkshire on the north, and consists of the five townships of Dronfield, Little Barlow, Coal Aston, Holmesfield, and Unstone. The whole parish contains 10,570A. 2R. 27P. of land, and in 1851, had 1,073 houses and 5,231 inhabitants, of whom 2,841 were males and 2,390 females; rateable value £14,610 5s. 1d. The townships of Dore and Totley were formerly in this parish, but by order of council, 31st January, 1844, they were united in a distinct parish for all ecclesiastical purposes.

DRONFIELD is a considerable and ancient village and township, pleasantly situated in a romantic valley, on the Chesterfield road, 6 miles S. by W. from Sheffield, the same distance N. by W. from Chesterfield, and 156 miles N.N.W. from London. The township contains 2,414 acres of land, and in 1851, had 515 houses and 2,469 inhabitants, of whom 1,336 were males and 1,133 females; rateable value £6,340. The manorial rights are vested in the Cecil family, and the land belongs to various owners. The air is said to be remarkably salubrious, and in the village are some fine springs of water. The place is fast improving, and becoming quite a populous neighbourhood; several old cottages have been taken down and new ones erected, principally at the north end of the village, but other places in proportion. The inhabitants participate largely in the edge-tool, scythe, and sickle manufactures; and here is an iron foundry, chemical works, corn mill, and spindle and flyer manufacturers, &c. The vicinity is noted for its superior coal, greatly in request for converting and refining steel. It formerly had a market, but from its proximity to Sheffield and Chesterfield, has long been disused. In 1854 the old Market Cross was taken down, and a monument of stone, to the memory of Sir Robert Peel, was erected on its site, at a cost of about £30, raised by subscription. A fair is still held on April 25th, and a hiring for servants is also held on the 3rd of November. The Church, dedicated to St. John Baptist, is a vicarage, valued in the King's book at £10 2s. 1d., now £224. In 1730 it was endowed with £200 benefactions, and £200 Queen Anne's bounty, and in 1811, with a subscription of £200, and a parliamentary grant of £600. The Lord Chancellor is the patron, and the Rev. W. D. B. Bertles, M.A., incumbent. The Church is a large and handsome gothic structure, 132 feet long, situated on an eminence, and has nave, chancel, side aisles and tower; (in which are six bells,) surmounted by a spire of the

same height. In 1843, Mr. Saml. Lucas, being then churchwarden, presented a new dial for the church clock, which cost about £50. In the church is a small but powerful organ, which has been removed from the west end to the body of the church. In 1855 the church was thoroughly repaired and re-pewed, at a cost of £1000, when 100 additional sittings, all free, were obtained. It formerly had a chantry, which stood on the site of the Green Dragon Inn, and was appropriated to Beauchief Abbey. In the church, are brasses, representing members of a branch of the Eyre family, and in the chancel, is a gravestone into which are inserted the figures of two priests, engraved on brass plates, they are habited in copes, the borders of which are ornamented with quartre-foils, between them is the figure of a bugle horn, and beneath them are two latin inscriptions. In the south aisle is an altar tomb of alabaster, enriched with figures of angels holding shields, upon it lies the statue of a Knight, clothed in plate armour of the 15th century, without helmet. In the west end of the church, is a stained glass window, representing St. John the Baptist, and our Saviour. The tithes were mostly purchased by the landowners, about eight years ago, for about £10,000; land was awarded in lieu of small tithes in 1842. The township was partly enclosed, under an act passed 1842. The General Baptist Chapel, erected in 1853, at a cost of £130, raised by subscription, is a neat stone building, with seats for 150 hearers, of which 100 are free. The Independent Chapel, erected by subscription, at a cost of £1000, is a good stone building, with galleries, and will accommodate 500; attached to which, is a day school, built in 1826, at a coat of £100, which will hold about 100. The Wesleyans have also a chapel here, erected by the Society of Friends, several years ago; it is a large square handsome building, with galleries, and will hold about 300. The *Grammar School* is an ancient building, a short distance from the church; it is endowed with lands, &c., left by Henry Fanshawe, in 1567, now worth about £230 per annum. It is open to all the children of the parish, 30 of whom are instructed free. The number of scholars at the present time is 51. The Rev. John Cockerton, M.A., is the head master, and Mr. John Garland, second master. The *Mechanics' Institution*, established October, 1850, consists of a library and reading rooms for all classes. The library contains 404 volumes of carefully selected books in various branches of literature, besides 191 periodicals, which afford the means for social, intellectual and moral elevation. The news room is constantly supplied with daily and weekly papers. The number of members are at present about 40, each of whom pay 1s. 6d. per quarter subscription. Mr. Samuel Lucas is the secretary, and Mr. John Rowe, librarian. The *Gas Works*, situated on the turnpike road from Sheffield to Chesterfield, is a small neat brick building, commenced, November, 1855, and completed, May, 1856, at a coat of about £1,700, (and including the apparatus, £2,000,) raised by 400 shareholders of £5 each. The gasometer holds 4,900 cubic feet, which is sold to the inhabitants at 6s. 6d. per 1000 cubic feet. Mr. Geo. Brookes, is the resident manager.

The manor of Dronfield belonged to the crown till the reign of King John, when it was granted to William Brierew; it was afterwards successively held by the Cromwell, Hastings, Seliokes, Morewoods, Burtons, and Rossingtons. Samuel Rotherham died seized of it in 1795; he was sheriff in 1773. His sister and heir bequeathed it to Mr. Joseph Cecil, in whose family it still remains.

COWLEY is a small village, 1 mile S.W. *Woodhouse* is another small village, 1 mile N.W., where the Wesleyan Methodists have a chapel, built, 1844. Here are several collieries. *Summerwood Top* consists of a few scattered farms. ½ mile N.W. *Mickley*, 2 miles N.W. contains three farms and a few cottages. *Hill-Top*, consists of a few scattered farms ½ mile S.

CHARITIES.—*Henry Fanshawe*, in 1567, left four years' profit of his lease of the parsonage, and certain lands, for building a school and maintaining a schoolmaster and usher at Dronfield; a few small exchanges have been made, which appear advantageous to the charity, and, the property now consists of a house, school, garden, and croft, occupied by the head master, a house and yard occupied by the usher, 46A, of land. in Dronfield,

26A. in Chesterfield, and seven acres in Eckington, producing a rental of £230, of which two-thirds are paid to the head master, and the remaining third to the usher, who instructs thirty children of the parish free. Previous to 1809 a suit was pending in Chancery, having originated in the appointment of the vicar to the office of schoolmaster, and to a refusal on his part to instruct the free scholars in anything except the classics. In consequence of this the school was for a time discontinued; but in 1809 the Rev. William Spencer was appointed to the vicarage, and on his application the suit was dismissed, and the costs of £1,100 were paid out of the estate, for which purpose timber and beds of coal on the charity lands were sold.

Richard Stevenson, in 1577, directed half a hundred of herrings and the bread from a strike of wheat, to be distributed on every Friday in lent; he also left thirty pence, to be given to the same number of poor persons. Edmund Stephenson left 33s. 4d., to be given to the poor yearly. These sums are charged upon a farm in Unston quarter.

James Swift, in 1610, left a rent charge of £3, issuing out of a messuage in Southwark; the amount is given in small sums to the poor.

Godfrey Godley, 1619, bequeathed 30s. yearly, charged on land in Handsworth, to be distributed to the poor of the parish.

Penny Acre Dole. A sum of 17s. is received by the churchwardens from Holmsfield, in respect of some land called the Penny Acres.

Rev. Lawrence Banks, in 1662, gave certain lands in Dronfield, for the benefit of the poor. The property consists of 5A. 0R. 7P., let for £11 11s. a year, besides which the getting of stone is let at the rate of £150 per acre. The proceeds are distributed on Good Friday.

John Revell, 1659, gave the profits of certain lands called the Nether and Over Deck Riddings, to the poor of the parish. There are now three closes, about nine acres, let for £14 per annum, which is distributed at Midsummer and Christmas.

Dorothy Hall, in 1711, bequeathed £100, to be invested in land, and the profits to be given to the vicar, for preaching four sermons on certain days. We have not been able to ascertain whether this was ever so laid out; but the vicar receives £2 as the gifts of Dorothy and Richard Hall, and retains £1 15s. for preaching sermons on Good Friday and Midsummer day, when he distributes 5s. in bread to the poor.

Andrew Morewood, in 1686, left the rents of a certain piece of land on trust; £2 thereof to be given to the vicar, and four nobles each to Dronfield, Coal Aston, and Unstone, for the instruction of poor children. The property consists of 15A. 0R. 11P, of land, let for £10 10s. per annum. £2 is paid to the vicar, £1 6s. 8d. to three schoolmistresses, who instruct six children each, and the residue is distributed amongst the poor of Coal Aston.

George Cooper, in 1763, left a rent charge of £2 12s., issuing out of his estate in Ditch lane, for a distribution of bread amongst twelve poor persons, every Sunday, of Dronfield, Unstone, and Coal Aston quarters, alternately, for ever.

Rev. Francis Gisborne's charity (see *Bradley*). The annual sum of £5 10s., received by the vicar, is laid out in warm clothing, and given to the poor about Christmas.

Lost Charities. A sum of £3 per annum, left by Rebecca Wright in 1675, and two other charities mentioned in the returns of 1786, we have not been able to obtain any information of.

Thomas Taylor, in 1681, left his messuages and lands on trust, the profits thereof to put forth poor children of Dronfield quarter apprentices.

Elizabeth Richardson, in 1684, devised certain lands on trust, to pay one half of the yearly profits thereof to the vicar, to preach a sermon on the 5th of August, and the other half for providing two coats for poor women. The property is let for 36s. a year, which is given as directed.

Elizabeth Dale, in 1743, gave the yearly sum of 10s., to be distributed to ten poor widows on St. Andrew's day.

BARLOW LITTLE is a small village and township intermixed with the parish of Great Barlow, $3\frac{3}{4}$ miles N.W. by N. from Chesterfield. The Dronfield part contains 486A. 1R. 3P. of land, and in 1851 had 12 houses and 68 inhabitants, of whom 41 were males and 27 females; rateable value £412 6s. The Duke of Rutland is lord of the manor and principal owner. Notwithstanding the houses are completely intermixed with Great Barlow and the land without any particular boundary, yet it keeps its own poor.

COAL ASTON is a small compact village and township, on the summit of a high hill, 1 mile N.E. from Dronfield, contains 1153A. 0R. 8P. of land, and in 1851 had 85 houses and 421 inhabitants, of whom 231 were males and 190 females; rateable value £2439 1s. 8d. Charles Cammel, Esq. is lord of the manor; and the principal owners are Mrs. Newton, Sir R. Sitwell, Bart., F. W. Bagshawe, Esq., James Addy, Esq., Messrs. Lloyd and Walker, James Rhodes, and the trustees of Mrs. Smith, besides several smaller owners. The Primitive Methodists have a small chapel here, erected in 1833, by subscription, at a cost of £120; it is a neat stone building, and will hold about 100. The Wesleyan Reformers have a neat stone chapel here, erected by the Wesleyans, in 1848, which will hold about 100. Bull close, 2 miles S. ; Hallows, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile S. ; Sicklebrook, 1 mile E. ; and South Povey, $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile E. from the village, are scattered farms.

Foleswood Colliery, situated in this township, on the Chesterfield road, is celebrated for the making of its excellent hard and soft coke, the hard coke for steel refining and the soft for forging purposes. An excellent house fire coal is also got here; Mr. William Thomas Badger is the proprietor. Here are also several other extensive collieries in the neighbourhood.

CHARITIES.—*Thomas Kent*, by will, 1695, bequeathed £100, to be invested in land, the rents thereof to be given in apprentice fees for poor children; if no such children in Coal Aston, then to the poor. The property now hold on trust consists of 9A. 3R. 1P. at Moor Top, a part of which was an allotment at the enclosure, producing a yearly rent of £16 per annum. Poor boys are occasionally placed out, and what remains is given to the poor.

HOLMESFIELD, a small straggling village, township, and chapelry, $2\frac{1}{4}$ miles W. from Dronfield, contains 4552A. of land, and in 1851 had 112 houses and 520 inhabitants, of whom 264 were males and 256 females; rateable value £2887 15s. The Duke of Rutland is lord of the manor and principal owner. Messrs. Hy. Penistone, Benjamin Bland, and William Morgan are also owners. The Chapel, dedicated to St. Swithin, a plain stone structure, was re-built in 1826, on the site of the old chapel; it is situated on an eminence and is seen at a great distance. The *living* is a perpetual curacy, valued in the King's book at £3, now worth £91. It has been endowed with £10 per annum, £200 benefactions, and £400 Queen Anne's bounty. Charles Cawton, Esq., patron, and the Rev. Thomas Hirst, B.A., incumbent, who resides at the Parsonage, a plain brick building, a little E. of the Church, which has been considerably improved during the time of the present incumbent, at his own expense. In 1831, the Duke of Rutland built a Sunday school here, which is also used as a day school; it consists of one room with a partition to divide the boys from the girls; the land was given by Mr. Matthew Webster. In 1845, a house was erected for the master situated on the common. The Wesleyan Methodist chapel is a small neat stone building erected in 1833, will hold about 90. Storth House is an ancient farm residence $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles N.W. in the occupation of Mr. William Hodkin; it is supposed that a castle formerly stood here, on the site now called Castle hill, and a moat which is now still visible probably surrounded it.

CARTLEDGE, is a small village three quarters of a mile S. by E. from Holmesfield. Cartledge Hall is an ancient farm house and is supposed to have been the residence of the Jolley family; it is built in the Elizabethan style, the ceilings of the rooms are handsomely carved, and on the mantle-piece in the front room is a representation of "The Fall of Man." Adam and Eve, are standing on each side of the Tree of Life, the serpent is tempting the latter, and Adam is in the act of plucking the fruit. Horsleygate $1\frac{1}{4}$ mile S.W.

consists of a few scattered farms. Horsleygate House is a large handsome mansion, pleasantly situated on a gentle acclivity,—the residence and property of Mr. Henry Penistone. Lydgate ¼ mile W. consists of a few scattered houses. Owlter Bar ¼ mile W., near which is the Peacock, a noted road side Inn, in a bleak situation at the cross of the Sheffield road.

CHARITIES.—*Free School.*—*Robert Moore*, in 1719, gave the profits of two closes called Maggeth Lees, for the instruction of ten children. *Prudence Moore*, in 1725, gave £60; *George Moore*, £10; and £38 16s. 8d. was raised by voluntary contributions, for erecting a school and augmenting the master's salary, with which a school house was built and a croft purchased, leaving a balance of £90 in favour of the charity; this, with other sums, amounting in the whole to £220, was laid out in the Penny Acres, containing 10A. 3R. 3P., in Dronfield parish. The purchase money was made up of the following sums:—The above £90, £52, left by *Mrs. Moore*, £10 by *John Jolley*, £10 by *Samuel Jolley*, £10 by *Mrs. Lee*, and £28 given by *Robt. Newton* and *Robert Moore, Esqrs.*; the remainder was raised by contributions. The Penny Acres are let for £10 18s. 3d. per annum; and an allotment of 1A. 0R. 27P. let for 20s. per annum. This sum comprises the rent of Maggeth Lees and of the allotment, and £5 8s. 1½d. from the rents of the Penny Acres; of the residue, £4 10s. 1½d. is for distribution of bread, and 19s. 3d. for clothing for two poor widows, both of which we are informed have not been paid.

Chapel Land.—At a court-baron for the manor of Holmesfield, held 1762, certain lands were surrendered upon trust, to pay all the rents to the minister performing divine service in the parochial chapelry of Holmesfield; for every default of such duty, the minister to forfeit 10s., to be distributed to the poor. The property thus appropriated consists of a house and about 60 acres of land, including 16 acres set out at the inclosure.

UNSTONE is a small village and township 4 miles N. by W. from Chesterfield and 8 miles S.S.W. from Sheffield, contains 1965A. 1R. 16P. of land, and in 1851 had 142 houses and 776 inhabitants, of whom 421 were males and 190 females; rateable value £2531 2s. 5d. *Charles Thorold, Esq.*, is lord of the manor and principal owner. *The Duke of Devonshire*, *Hy. Rangeley, Esq.*, *Mr. Samuel Parker*, and *Mr. Robert Sykes Ward* are also owners. In 1833, a neat school with a residence for the master was erected by *George Moore, Esq.*, who, during his life paid £13 per annum towards the maintenance of the master, who now lives rent free, but has no salary. The school will hold about 70, and the average attendance is 50. The Wesleyan Methodist chapel is a neat stone building, erected in 1847, which will seat about 100 persons. The commons were enclosed in 1839.

Thomas Curtys, in 1701, left £100 to be invested in land; out of the proceeds thereof 40s. to be paid to the vicar, 30s. in apprentice fees for poor boys of Unstone, and 30s. to the poor. The yearly sum of £5 is charged on a farm at Norton, and paid to the vicar of Dronfield, who retains £2 for himself, and distributes the remaining £3 to the poor of Unstone.

ECKINGTON is an extensive parish and township, and contains the hamlets of Mosborough, Renishaw, and Troway, which keep their poor conjointly, and have 6,934A. 2R. 8P. of land, and in 1851, had 1,046 houses, and 4,958 inhabitants, of whom 2,639 were males and 2,339 females; rateable value £18,591 4s. 0d. The land is mostly a strong fertile soil, and was inclosed in 1795. It is bounded on the east by the river Rother, which separates it from Killamarsh, having the parish of Norton on the west, and the parish of Handsworth, in Yorkshire, on the north. The rectory was formerly held with that of Killamarsh, which together were worth about £1,600 per annum; but by an Order in Council, dated June 10th, 1843, pursuant to the reforming plans of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, Killamarsh was made a separate rectory; and Ridgway, with the Troway quarter, a perpetual curacy and distinct parish. Troway forms the western side of the parish of Eckington, with which it still keeps its poor, but each quarter keeps its own roads. This parish is the great seat of the sickle and reaping hook manufactory, and is included in the Sheffield Corporation of Cutlers.

ECKINGTON is a large irregular built village and market town, situated on the southern acclivity of a narrow valley, from which there is a tedious flight of steps up to the church. It is 7 miles N.E. by E. from Chesterfield, and 7 miles S.E. from Sheffield. Sir Sitwell Reresby Sitwell, Bart., is principal owner and lord of the manor, which includes the whole parish, and in the reign of Henry I, was held by J. Langford, "by grand sergeantry to find one horse of the value of 5s., with a sack and spur, for the king's wars in Wales, for forty days." At the Norman survey there was a priest and servant at Eckington, but no church. The manor and advowson of the church, however, in the reign of Edward II., were held by Elizabeth, wife of R. Stuteville. The Church, dedicated to St. Peter and St. Paul, is an ancient edifice in the Anglo-Norman style, with a tower and spire, remarkably heavy and void of ornament. The *living* is a rectory, valued in the King's book at £40 13s. 4d., now £774, in the patronage of the Crown; the Rev. Edmund Bucknall Estcourt, M.A., incumbent, and the Rev. J. Eastwood, M.A., curate. In the church are some ancient monuments, on one of which is a male and female figure kneeling on one knee, in the costume of the time of Charles II. The organist has an endowment of £14 a year, arising from land, and £5 from other sources. The Rectory is a large stone mansion, erected about 1720, with extensive pleasure grounds, commanding a fine view of the surrounding country; it is at present occupied by the curate. The Wesleyans have a chapel, erected in 1807, and the Association Methodists one, built in 1837. The school, rebuilt in 1832, at a cost of upwards of £600, is open to all the poor of the parish: in consequence of the late rector (who seldom visited the parish) having the deeds at his residence in Wales, the Charity Commissioners could not report on it. Here is a girls' school, conducted on the National plan, which is in part supported by Lady Sitwell, the children paying a small fee weekly; about 55 attend. The *Mechanics' Institution*, established 1854, has a small library and news room in connection with it. Thomas McLaurin, jun., librarian. Petty-sessions are held on the second Wednesday in every month. In 1852, a Court-house with a lock-up was erected; it is a large substantial stone building, near the White Hart Hotel. The market is held on Friday; and fairs are held on the first Wednesday in April and October; and a statute fair for hiring servants on the 6th November. The feast is on the first Sunday after Midsummer day. Races are held during the feast week. In the time of William the Conqueror, this manor (*Echintone*) was in the possession of Ralph, the son of Hubert. At this time there was a priest at Eckington, but we find no mention of any church being here, until the beginning of the 14th century. In the reign of Edward I. this manor belonged to one Langford, from whom it has passed, by various changes, to the present owner.

MOSBOROUGH is a large scattered and irregular built village, situated on a acclivity 8 miles N.N.E. from Chesterfield, and 6 miles S.S.E. from Sheffield, lying to the north of Eckington, from which it is divided by a small brook. Sir Sitwell Reresby Sitwell, Bart., is lord of the manor and principal owner, besides which, here are several small free-holders. *Mosborough Hall* is a large square stone structure, with stone balustrades on the top, situated at the summit of the village, the seat and property of Charles Rotherham, Esq. The Wesleyan Methodists have a neat stone chapel here, erected in 1839, and the Primitive Methodist a small one, erected in 1830. Many sickles and hooks are manufactured, and here are also collieries where coke is burned for steel refiners. In 1835, a corn mill here was destroyed by fire. Here is a Free School for boys and girls, (see *Charities*) erected in 1821, by subscription, at a cost of £200, and is endowed with lands, &c., amounting to £28 10s. per annum, left by Joseph Stones, in 1680. The master instructs 15 children free, for which he has a house and garden rent free. The school, is a neat stone building, and will hold about 100. It is taught on the National plan, and about 55 attend. Mosborough includes Mosborough Moor, (now enclosed on the north), and consists of a colliery and a few cottage houses, with two inns; *Plumley*, a small hamlet, about $\frac{3}{4}$ mile W., contains two farms; and *Holbrook*, a small hamlet, $\frac{3}{4}$ mile E., where there are a few cottages.

RENISHAW is a small village situated in the vale of the Rother, on the east of Eckington, 7½ miles N.E. by N. from Chesterfield. Here are the extensive iron furnaces and foundries of Messrs. Appleby and Co. The Chesterfield canal passes close to the works, which affords every means of transit for their metals and castings, for which they stand pre-eminent. The Midland railway has also a station near Renishaw Iron-works, near which is the Sitwell Arms Inn, conveniently adapted for the accommodation of passengers, and where a cab is always in readiness. Here is a Free School, endowed by Thomas Cannon and others,—(See *Charities*),—with lands, &c., the rents thereof to be paid to the schoolmaster for instructing poor children of Renishaw and Eckington. The school is a commodious stone building, rebuilt in 1832, at a cost of about £600. *Renishaw Hall*, about ½ mile S.E. from Eckington, is a large handsome stone mansion with a centre and wings; from the centre, which stands a little backward, projects a semi-octagonal entrance, surmounted by battlements having pinnacles at the corners, with vanes rising from the wings and centre. It is pleasantly situated in an extensive park, well wooded, fronting the north, commanding an extensive prospect, lying on the west side of the Sheffield road and of the vale of the Rother. It is the property of Sir Sitwell Resesby Sitwell, Bart.

SPINK HILL is a hamlet and small village, situated on a lofty eminence 1 mile E. of Renishaw, and has long been noted for its Catholic chapel, and where a handsome Catholic church was erected in 1845, with a tower, from which rises a spire 50 feet high. A handsome building, principally of brick, has also been erected, which forms three sides of a square, the projecting ends finished octangular with stone; the enclosed side has a stone piazza, crossing from the other two sides, over which is a singular looking screen, covered to the height of the building, giving free access around the outside of the building, yet sheltered from the weather. It is cemented in imitation of stone. This is a Jesuit college, for the education of youth, and is a branch from Stoneyhurst, in Lancashire, established there by some refugees driven from their establishment at Liege, in 1794, by the horrors of war and the proscriptions of the French revolution. In connexion with which, in 1852, a School was erected, with a house for the master, at a cost of upwards of £600, raised by subscription. It is a handsome stone building in the Gothic style, open to all denominations, and is under general inspection; it will accommodate about 120, and the average attendance is about 90.

RIDGWAY, is a small village 5 miles S.S.E. from Sheffield, and 8 miles N. by E. from Chesterfield, forming the western side of Eckington parish, with which it still keeps its poor. It was by order in Council, dated 10th June, 1843, made ecclesiastically a distinct parish. The manufacturing of sickle and reaping hooks is carried on here to a considerable extent. The Church, dedicated to St. John the Baptist, is a small neat building, on a declivity, was erected in 1840 at a cost of £2,000, raised by subscription, aided by grants from the Incorporated Society for Building and Enlarging Churches, and from the Diocesan Society of £800. It is a stone building, of unpresuming appearance, having a buttress surmounted with a cross, which holds one bell. The *living* is a perpetual curacy, valued at £300. The rector of Eckington patron, Rev. Alexander Crawford Bromehead, jun., B.A., incumbent, and the Rev. R. K. Bolton, B.A., curate. It is endowed with £280 per annum, paid from the rectorial tithe or corn rent of Eckington; the rent of 28 pews in the church is also appropriated to the augmentation of the resident curate's stipend, as specified in the deed of endowment. The Methodist chapel, erected 1806, is a neat stone building, with burial ground attached. The National School, erected 1837, by private subscription, is a small neat building. Grants from the National School Society of £30, and from the Lords of Her Majesty's treasury of £80, were obtained towards defraying the expenses of the erection. At the enclosure of Eckington, in 1795, 2A. 3R. 5P. of land was vested in the rector and churchwardens for the use of a schoolmaster, in consideration of his teaching 5 poor children of Ridgway and Troway quarter. The master also had a dwelling house provided. This land is now let for £4 10d. per annum, which is paid

to the master of the national school, who teaches 5 poor children free. *Carter Lane* 1 mile W. from Ridgway, consists of a few scattered farms. *Carter Hall* an ancient residence now in the occupation of Mr. Edwin Inman. *Ford*, 1 mile S. by W., situated in a deep glen, is a small hamlet, noted for its ancient sickle manufactory. *High Lane*, ½ mile N., consists of a few scattered houses. *White Lane* on the N.W., where is *Charnock Hall*, an ancient mansion, the property of George Rhodes, Esq. *Sload Lane* is a scattered district of farms, ½ mile W. *Troway*, the ancient seat of the sickle manufacture, is a small scattered village, situated on a lofty eminence in a sequestered spot, 1½ miles S. W. from Ridgway, and 6 miles N. by E. from Chesterfield. It forms with Ridgway ecclesiastically a distinct parish, but still keeps its poor with Eckington. *Bramley* a small village, 1 mile E. by S. from Troway, a little north of which is *Bole Hill*, another small hamlet. *Marsh Lane* a scattered district of houses, extending 2½ miles S. from Ridgway, and partly in Eckington quarter.

CHARITIES.—*Margaret Foljambe*, widow, in 1762, directed a rent charge of £5 per annum, to be paid out of a tenement at Barlborough Wood Lane End, and several closes of land called the Croft, the Little Ox close, the Great Meadow, and the Long Meadow. These premises are now in the possession of Sir S. R. Sitwell, subject to the above payment, which is distributed at the vestry on St. Thomas's day, 40s. thereof equally amongst 20 poor widows, and the residue to 60 other poor persons of the quarters of Eckington and Renishaw, in sums of 1s. each. An annual sum of £4 is received by the overseers, as a charge upon some part of the estate of E. S. Chandos Pole, Esq., which is given in sums varying from 1s. to 2s. 6d.

Jonathan Bromehead, in 1791, left on trust for the benefit of the poor, certain messuages in Eckington, and an allotment of land, containing 1A. 0R. 20P. on Eckington Marsh. The following benefactions may be considered as forming part of this charity, though given by the *Rev. Joseph Bromehead* and other persons of his family, in consequence of the loss of a legacy intended to have been given by the said Jonathan Bromehead. The sum of £200 in 1819, and the sum of £100 in 1827, were invested in the three per cent. consols. Out of the income of the charities, consisting of rents and dividends, seven 5d. loaves are given weekly to poor families of Eckington and Renshaw quarters.

Henry Inman, in 1711, devised his lands and tenements at Newbold, upon trust, the rents and profits thereof to provide strong warm blue gowns, with the letters H and I to be set upon one of the sleeves. The land is now let for £6 10s. per annum. One moiety thereof is given to Eckington quarter, and one moiety to Mosborough. In 1828, the ironstone and timber growing on this estate were sold for £102, which was laid out in the purchase of land at Bramley Brooks, the proceeds of which is applied as above.

MOSBOROUGH SCHOOL.—*Joseph Stones*, by will, dated 20th May, 1680, devised certain premises and lands, upon trust, to bestow the rents upon a schoolmaster, for teaching 15 poor children within the Bierlow of Mosborough. Proceedings were instituted by the *Rev. Frederick Ricketts*, and five others, for the purpose of having new trustees appointed and for the removal of the schoolmaster. Under an order of the Court of Chancery, 6th June, 1822, the property was vested in Luke Staniforth, Thomas Hutton, and five others, and the schoolmaster directed to give up possession of the school premises. The property consists of a dwelling house, homestead, croft and garden, containing 3R. 13P., the school, and a playground of one rood, the great and little Beighton Hill doses, 4 acres, which were divided by making a turnpike road, let for £14 8s.; the allotment in Street field, 3R. 22P., let for £3 15s.; an allotment on Mosborough Green made by the award of the Commissioners, 1804, containing 2A. 1R, 23P. let for £10 6s. 7d. When the schoolmaster gave up possession the buildings were in bad condition, and £131 was expended in building a new schoolroom and repairs. The costs of the suit in Chancery was £156 8s. 5d. Early in

1823 a new master was appointed with a salary of £8, the remainder of the rents being reserved for liquidating the above expenses, for which 15 children of Mosborough are instructed in reading and writing.

The Rev. Francis Gisborne, in 1817, left £5 10s. per annum, to be expended in flannel and coarse woollens, and distributed to the poor in winter.

The yearly sum of 19s. from *Denham's charity*, is carried to the account of the poor-rate. (See *Clown*).

Parish Lands.—At a court baron, in 1680, *Margaret Freeton* surrendered to the churchwardens and overseers for the use of the poor, the land now consisting of the Nether High Bramley, and the Upper High Bramley. An allotment of 1R. 15P. was set out to the overseers in respect thereof, at the enclosure. There is also a field, containing 1A. 1R. 22P. which is let by the parish officers. The rents of all these lands, amounting to £15 14s. per annum, are carried to the general account of the overseers.

RENISHAW SCHOOL.—*Thomas Camm*, in 1702, surrendered all his copyhold messuages and lands, upon trust, to cause a school house to be built. He also directed the yearly rents thereof, except 40s. a year for the repairs of the school, to be given for the maintenance of a schoolmaster, for instructing poor children of this parish free. In 1715, *George Sitwell* gave a messuage and croft adjoining, on trust, for the use of the schoolmaster, provided that no person be appointed master without the consent of George Sitwell or his heirs. *Lady Fretchevill* bequeathed £100 to this school. In 1719, this legacy with £20 given by Sir *George Sitwell, Bart.*, to equalize an exchange of land, was laid out in the purchase of £200 11s. 4d. three per cent. consols.

Peter Cadman, in 1808, directed his executor to place out on government securities, a sufficient sum of money to secure £5 per annum, to be given to the free school at Eckington.

Lost Charities.—There are several benefactions mentioned on a tablet in the church, formerly given to the poor, which have been lost for many years, as well as the charities of *Thamos and William Rotherham*.

ELMTON parish contains the township of Elmton and part of the hamlet of Cresswell, which is also in Whitwell parish. The entire parish comprises an area of 2772A. 0R. 22P. of land, and in 1851 had 80 houses and 435 inhabitants, of whom 244 were males and 191 females; rateable value £2256 14s. 6d. It forms the eastern boundary of the Scarsdale Hundred, on the Nottinghamshire border. The soil is principally on lime stone, with a portion of strong clay, forming a fine agricultural district, having a bold undulating surface.

ELMTON, is a small village and township pleasantly situated in an open district, 9 miles E. by N. from Chesterfield; at the north extremity of the township is a romantic rocky ravine, designated "Markland's Grip," and much admired by Spencer Hall in his "Rural Rides." The Duke of Portland is lord of the manor and principal owner, besides which here are a few small freeholders. The commons situated at the north end of the village were enclosed in 1849. The Church, dedicated to St. Peter, is a plain modern stone edifice, with a chancel and low square tower, reaching only a few feet above the roof which is partly tiled and carried to form a gable. In the chancel, is a slab with a cross fleury engraved on it and this inscription in text hand, "Orate pro aia Roberti Berbi." The *living* is a vicarage, valued in the King's book at £5 1s. 3d., now £120, has been augmented with £200 benefactions; £400 Queen Anne's bounty; and £300 parliamentary grant. The Duke of Portland is patron and the Rev. Wm. Senior Salman M.A., of Shireoaks, incumbent. The vicarage a small ancient building a little north from the church, is occupied as a cottage. The late Rev. Mr. Foxlow, of Staveley, left a sum of money for a new vicarage house to be erected, but on account of the incumbent not residing here it has never taken place. Here is 1A. 1R. 3P. of glebe land, and the tithes are paid by a rent charge amounting to about £75. Here is a small day school. Arrangements are now being made for the erection of a Parochial school, which will shortly take place; and when built, will give accommodation to about 400 children of both sexes. It will be open to the inhabitants of the surrounding villages who chose to send their children to receive instruction. Considering the miserable state of education both at Elmton and the surrounding neighbourhood, the inhabitants will not only be glad of such a change, but also happy to find such good accommodation afforded to their Children. Feast, first Sunday after St. Peter's day. This place was formerly celebrated for its elm trees, which surrounded the churchyard and grounds, and it is most probable that from this the name Elmton arose, some of the finest elm trees which were ever known to exist have grown in this village. The trees which surrounded the churchyard have been cut down by the present incumbent. It is said here formerly was an old Roman encampment on the site now called the Sand-hill. When the commons were enclosed several ancient spear heads, some of which were of flint, were found here, also several old coins, all of which are in the possession of John Brown, Esq. In 1665 the whole parish of Elmton was let at a sum under £150 per annum.

Elmton Park, now in the occupation of John Brown, Esq., is a large and commodious residence, situated 1 mile E. from Elmton, was built by the late Heathcote Rodes, Esq.

The Park formerly belonged to Thurgarton Priory, Nottinghamshire, and consisted of the farm now occupied by Mr. Brown, the boundaries of which are still visible. The present occupier is about making great alterations to the house, he has also greatly improved the farm, which is now in a state of high cultivation, and is considered about the best in the district. Whaley Hall, 1 mile S.E. from Elmton, is a good substantial farm residence, the property of the Duke of Portland and occupied by Mr. Heaton Aldam. This place is noted as the birthplace of the celebrated arithmetical calculator, Jedediah Buxton, the son of the schoolmaster of Elmton and grandson of the vicar. He was born in 1707, and when a child he evinced the most excessive stupidity and unwillingness to learn anything, he was a day labourer totally devoid of ordinary education; how he first became acquainted with the relative proportions of numbers and their progressive denominations he did not know, but to this he applied the whole force of his mind, when he once understood a question he began to work with amazing facility, after his own method without the use of a pen, pencil or chalk, or even understanding the common rules of arithmetic; he would stride over a piece of land and calculate the contents of it as if it had been measured by a chain. In this way he measured the extensive manor of Elmton, and brought Sir John Rodes the contents, not only in acres, roods, and perches, but in square inches; and afterwards, for his own amusement, reduced them into square hairs breadths. On another occasion, a person once proposed to him this question: in a body, the three sides of which are 23,145,789 yards, 5,642,732 yards, and 54,965 yards, how many cubic eighths of an inch. In about 5 hours he actually solved this intricate problem, though in the midst of business, and surrounded by more than one hundred labourers. There is an engraved portrait of him taken from a drawing made by Miss Hartley, in January, 1764, at which period according to his own calculations he had existed 1,792,230,823 seconds; he died in 1777 in his 70th year.

At the *Norman* survey they were at *Helmetune*, a church and a priest. In the time of Edward III. the Church was given by Ralph Deincourt, its founder, to Thurgarton priory, Nottinghamshire. The manor at Domesday survey, belonged to Walter Deincourt, in whose family it continued till the death of William, Lord Deincourt, in 1442. Ralph, Lord Cromwell, who married one of his sisters and coheirress, died seized of it in 1454, his sister and heirress brought it to Sir Wm. Lovell. In 1485 on the attainder of William, Lord Lovel it was granted to Sir John Savage, and in the reign of Queen Elizabeth came into the possession of Sir Francis Rodes, in whose family it remained until 1854, when William Hatfield de Rodes, Esq., sold it to the late Duke of Portland.

CRESSWELL is a hamlet and scattered village, being about 1 mile in length; it is situated 2 miles N.E. from Elmton and 10 miles E.N.E. from Chesterfield, the land is principally on limestone, producing good corn. The Duke of Portland is the principal owner and lord of the manor, which is freehold, besides several smaller owners. It is said that the manor of Whitwell extends into Cresswell, which part was given to Welbeck abbey, by Ralph Cordi. Cresswell is partly in Elmton parish, and partly in Whitwell parish, the river Wallen dividing the two parishes. Cresswell Crag, a singular and beautiful assemblage of rocks, near the N.E. extremity of the township, and on the verge of Nottinghamshire, 3 miles S.W. from Worksop. Lying out of the way of good roads, and almost inaccessible for carriages, they are not often visited by tourists, though remarkably curious—consisting of lofty precipitous rocks, torn by some convulsion of nature into a thousand romantic shapes, and presenting a miniature representation of the more majestic scenery of the Derwent or Dove. The house now occupied by Mr. James Aldam, is supposed formerly to have been a Roman Catholic chapel; it is in the Elizabethan style of architecture, several additions and improvements have been made to it during the time Mr. Aldam has occupied it; some time ago, whilst repairing the house, an old constable's bill was found here, dated the time of Cromwell, also a piece of silver coin of a date before the time of Christ, the latter of which was sold during the Exhibition at London, in 1851. Frithwood, 1 mile N.E., is a good substantial farm residence in the occupation of Messrs. Edward and John Wilson.

HEATH is a small compact agricultural village and parish, situate on the Chesterfield and Mansfield road, 4½ miles S.E. from the former, and 7¾ miles N.W. from the latter. It contains 1608A. 34P. of land, and in 1851 had 83 houses and 378 inhabitants, of whom 201 were males and 177 females; of this number 30 averaged above 77 years of age; rateable value, £1850. The Duke of Devonshire is lord of the manor, and owner of 999A. 0R. 5P. of land. Earl Manvers owns 457A. 0R. 6P.; and the Exors. of the late Sir Jas. Hunloke 144A. 0R. 23P.; besides which here, are about 8A. owned by other individuals. The old Church was taken down in 1852, and the present one erected and consecrated in 1853. It is a small, handsome stone building, dedicated to All Saints, and has a tower, surmounted by a fine spire and three bells. It will accommodate about 150, of which 80 sittings are free. The cost of the building was about £1,350, raised by subscription, towards which the Duke of Devonshire gave £400 and the site; and a grant of £50 was obtained from the Church Building Society. In the east end of the church is a handsome stained window representing Christ's resurrection and ascension. The *living* is a vicarage, valued in the King's book at £4 18s. 9d., now £174, in the presentation of the Duke of Devonshire, and incumbency of the Rev. G. H. Arkwright, who resides at the vicarage—a large handsome mansion, situated about the centre of the village. Here are 5A. of glebe land, and the tithes have been commuted for £230. Here is a school, endowed in 1687, with £15 per annum, by the Countess and Earl of Devonshire. It is a small, neat building, erected in 1821, and is situated a short distance from the parsonage. The children pay 2d., 4d., and 6d. per week, for instruction. About 50 attend. The church of Heath, alias Lowne, or Lund, was given to the Abbey of Croxton, at the time of its foundation, in 1162, and the great tithes appropriated to that monastery. The advowson was given by Queen Mary to the burgesses of Derby, but now belongs to the Duke of Devonshire. It is supposed that it came into the possession of the present proprietor in the sixth year of the reign of Edward VI., when Mr. Cavendish

had in exchange for his estates in Hertfordshire several lands and manors belonging to dissolved priories and abbeys in Derbyshire. The manor was given by Robert de Ferrers, Earl of Derby, to the monks of Gerondon, in Leicestershire, and was probably granted to the Earl of Shrewsbury. Owlcotes, or Oldcotes, a farm house one mile N.W. Here formerly was a noble mansion, one of the three built by Elizabeth Countess of Shrewsbury. The mansion and estate passed with one of the Earl of Shrewsbury's grand-daughters to the Pierrepont family, and was in 1673 the seat of George Pierrepont, Esq., grandson of the Earl of Kingston. The house was taken down many years ago, and the estate belongs to Earl Manvers.

KILLAMARSH is a parish and widely scattered village, 8½ miles N.E. by N. from Chesterfield, and bordering on Yorkshire, from which county it is separated on the north-west by a small stream, which falls into the river Rother. The parish contains several small hamlets, besides Killamarsh, otherwise Churchtown, the whole of which comprise an area of 1,601A. 2R. 5P. of land, and in 1851, had 210 houses, and a population of 1,070 souls, of whom 543 were males and 527 females; rateable value £3,838 4s. 10d. E. S. C. Pole, Esq., is the principal owner, and lord of the manor, which is freehold, Sir S. R. Sitwell, Bart, Messrs. Joseph and George Wells, Mr. Wm. Lowe, Mrs. Charlotte Storey, with several others, are also owners. The soil is various, mostly strong, with a full proportion of arable. The Church, dedicated to St. Giles, a venerable stone edifice, was formerly in the Norman style, of which the archway inside the porch is all that now remains. The chancel was rebuilt in 1846, by the present rector, at a cost of £600.; it is in the late decorated style. The body of the church is now in the Tudor style of architecture; it contains nave, chancel, porch, and tower, in which are 6 bells, placed there by the inhabitants. The eastern window is a beautiful specimen of painted glass, by the celebrated Warrington. The *living* is a rectory, which was annexed to the rectory of Eckington, from which it was separated by an Order of Council, June 10th, 1843, pursuant to the plans of the Ecclesiastical Commissioners, and was declared to be an independent rectory, and is of the value of £320, of which £120 is paid by Eckington. It is in the patronage of the Crown, and incumbency of the Rev. Edward Herbert Smith, B.A. Here are 100 acres of glebe land, and the tithes were commuted in 1844, for £200. An inscription on a tablet outside the church, states that John Wright, a pauper of the parish, died May 4th, 1797, in the 103rd year of his age, and that he was temperate and cheerful, and in the trying situation of darkness, poverty, and old age, bore his infirmities with such christian meekness as excited the benevolence of good men,

and is here recorded as an instructive lesson to others. The Independent Chapel, is a small neat stone building, erected in 1852. Here is free school, endowed by Robt. Turie, and others, about 46 attend, 25 of which are instructed free. The Chesterfield canal passes the parish on the west and north side, and crosses a deep narrow ravine and foot road by an aqueduct. The Midland railway also crosses the western boundary. Feast, first Sunday after St. Giles. *Bridgefoot*, 1½ miles W. is a small hamlet, consisting of a few farms and cottages: here is a bridge over the Chesterfield canal. *Gannow Lane*, a road extending to the N., where at one mile distance, is Gannow House, the seat of Thomas Need, Esq., J.P., and property of the Rev. Geo. Alderson. *High Moor Top*, situated on an eminence ½ mile E., consists of a few farms. *Nethergreen* with *Littlemoor*, and *Nethermoor*, a district of scattered houses, extending 1 mile N.W. *Netherthorpe*, ¾ mile W.S.W., is a small scattered village, situated at the foot of a lofty range of hills; the Forge, about 1 mile distant, is a small village, where is Killamarsh Old Hall, a neat residence occupied by Mr. Wm. Lowe. Messrs. Webster and Horsfall of Birmingham, have an establishment here, for the manufacture of their patented music wire, and also for the refining of steel. *Upper Thorpe* is a small village, situated on a lofty eminence ½ mile S. *West Thorpe* is a small village, ¾ mile S. from the church. This place, *Chinewoldemarese*, at the Domesday survey, is described as being in two manors, one of them belonging to Ascot Musard, the other to the King's Thanes. In the reign of King John, Hugh de Dovecote had a manor, and in the following reign, Cecily Meynell; and in that of Edward II., Hugh son of William de Kinwaldmarsh. At a later period there is no record of any other manor than that held by the family of Hathersage, which passed in moieties to the Longfords and Goushills. Sir Ralph Longford died seized of a moiety in 1513, and Sir William Holles died seized of the other moiety in 1542. Sir Thomas Holles sold his moiety to Sir Richard Pype and George Basford. Sir Richard died seized of it in 1587; in 1817 it was the property of Sir George Sitwell Bart. The Hewitts had considerable property in this parish, which passed to the Osbornes. This manor was held by the tennre of providing for the King's army in Wales, a horse of the value of 5s., with a sack and spur for four days.

CHARITIES.—*William Hewitt*, in 1599, gave £100 to be invested in land the proceeds thereof to be expended in bread, and distributed to the poor. The amount was laid out in land, at Cawthorne, Yorkshire. About the year 1807, the churchwarden and overseer agreed to exchange this property with Mr. Stanhope, but, at a meeting of the freeholders and inhabitants, it was resolved this exchange should not be ratified; and by a decree, 8th May, 1811, the exchange was set aside. The premises consist of 15A. 2R., let at the rent of £45 per annum. In 1813, timber on the estate was cut and sold for £365, and £69 18s. 7d. was also due from Mr. Thomas Ward, as the receiver of the charity. A distribution of sixpenny loaves is made every week, so as to keep the expenditure nearly equal with the income.

William Hewitt, in 1480, left a rent-charge of 15s. yearly, out of the town close, which is distributed with Ward's charity.

John Ward, in 1669, left £3 12s. per annum, out of land called Hautcliff, which is paid by Sir Sitwell Reresby Sitwell, and given to the poor in half-crowns.

John Kay, in 1741, directed ten penny loaves, three coats and three gowns, to be paid out of his lands called Broad close, the Delves, and the Boiley close.

Henry Murfin, in 1744, left a rent-charge of £5, out of the Broomhills, for a distribution of coats and gowns, to five poor men and five poor women.

Sarah Pole, in 1747, left £30 for a distribution of bread every Sunday.

Rev. Francis Gisborne's charity.—(See *Bradley*.) The annual sum of £7 10s. received by the incumbent, is laid out in flannel and given to the poor.

KILLAMARSH SCHOOL—*Robert Turie*, by will, 1720, gave his house and close, called Six lands, in Killamarsh, on trust, to apply the profits thereof to instruct six poor children,
